	The Plan is currently subject to independent scrutiny following which it should only be subject to a local referendum prior to adoption as official planning policy guidance		
	<ul> <li>In partnership with the Parish Council and other residents, the Association played a vital part in defending the planning authority's decision to reject a speculative planning application to develop upon Barrow Farm only to find that the whole process has to be heard again in August 2017. In this regard the Resident's Association proposed (and the Meeting agreed) a vote of thanks be recorded to Rachel Hooper</li> </ul>		
2.03	MAUD HEATH TRUST		
	The report of the Maud Heath Trustees was read to the Parish Meeting by Councillor Julie Hoskins (also newly elected Chair of the Trustees); the principal observations on the year being as follows:		
	<ul> <li>Proposals are being considered for the widening of the road in East Tytherton, repairing the railings and stone plinth to the main monument, replacing the oak bollards by the river monument, refurbishing the memorial seats.</li> </ul>		
	At the raised footpath at Kellaways works are required to the floodgates, arches and stonework which (hopefully) will proceed in the coming year, subject to finance being in place.		
	Original kerb stones have been removed and placed into storage following the creation of the new access onto the B4069 by Wavin Plastics.		
	The Parish Meeting agreed that better tourist/heritage signage of the route of the Causeway would be a valuable addition, and the Annnual Meeting also thanked Julie for her continued support to the Trustees.

	<ul> <li>However fewer events are taking place which are truly village-based.</li> </ul>					
	A number of questions were raised about the future viability of the hall. However it was also noted that the residential growth of Chippenham was also likely to generate community infrastructure levy (CIL) for future investment
